
coaches with different points of view.

Bryant & Stratton hires coach for new men's team

Bobcats to compete starting in 2023 under Todd Gray

Bryant & Stratton College – Wisconsin Athletics has named Todd Gray as its head men's volleyball coach for the inaugural season starting in spring 2023.

Bobcats men's volleyball will be the first junior college program in Wisconsin. The program will compete at the NJCAA Division I level, which gives the opportunity to offer athletic scholarships to student athletes.

Gray will lead the launch, recruitment and development of the Bobcats men's volleyball program on and off the court.

"What an honor it is to be selected as the Men's Volleyball Coach at Bryant & Stratton College for the inaugural season, Gray said. "I am excited about the opportunity to building a tradition of excellence for the program this year and for years to come."

Gray has coached JV boys at Whitefish Bay High School and was head coach at Waukesha North from 2018-20. He also created and directed the United Boys Youth Volleyball Club and has coached boys and girls club for the Midwest Penguins and Pewaukee Volleyball Club.

Volleyball is the fastest growing team sport in the United States for high school boys. The NJCAA recognized men's volleyball as an emerging sport and sanctioned the sport for competition starting in 2022. More than 80 universities have added men's volleyball in

the last five years – mostly at the NCAA Division I, Division II, Division III, NAIA levels, and now at the two-year college level.

"This is a great opportunity for Bryant & Stratton to attract young men to compete in NJCAA volleyball while having the opportunity to receive a scholarship while pursuing a degree," Bryant & Stratton Athletic Director Greg Brandner said.

Bryant & Stratton College, along with 14 other junior colleges, received a \$10,000 grant

earlier this year from the NJCAA Foundation and First Point Volleyball Foundation to start a men's volleyball program.

"The ability to create more opportunities for student-athletes to compete in college and take part in a growing sport is one of the ultimate wins the NJCAA Foundation can achieve," said Brian Luckett, NJCAA Foundation Executive Director. "We are appreciative of First Point Volleyball Foundation for making this possible and the NJCAA member colleges who have stepped up to make history by bringing back men's volleyball to the association."

Bryant & Stratton currently offers women's indoor volleyball and women's beach volleyball. The addition of men's volleyball, along with women's flag football in fall 2022, will bring Bobcats Athletics sports offering to 22 programs.

Gray played collegiately as an outside hitter for the University of Wisconsin – Milwaukee men's volleyball team while earning his degree in bachelor's degree in Criminal Justice with a minor in Political Science from the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee.

Gray resides in the City of Pewaukee with his wife Alexis and his children Brendan, Alyssa, and Ethan.

3C clinics available for clubs

The Coaches Coaching Coaches program designed by the Badger Region has returned for the 2021-22 season. The program, also known as 3C, welcomes clubs to invite experienced and respected lead coaches chosen by the Badger Region to come to a practice and mentor a handful of lead coaches at a club.

They in turn would then take the information they learned at the clinic and pass it on to other coaches in the program.

The first 3C clinic wrapped up last week at River City Volleyball Club and the feedback has been great since.

If your club is still interested in having one or two of our 3C lead coaches come out to your practice and help work with your coaches, please fill out the form ASAP.

A few notes:

1. The design of this opportunity is to have future mentor coaches from a club work with the 3C lead coaches from the Region while one or two teams practice like they normally would (this would not require your players/coaches to come in on another night). It is not designed to be for a club's whole roster of coaches. The Region hopes to work with 3-4 future mentor coaches from a club, plus the 3-4 coaches who are running the practices that night to be the ones we are truly working with.

2. The Region's coaches will not be running the practice. They will ask for a practice plan of the teams practicing in advance and we will critique. They will modify it, ask questions, and help reinforce a philosophy or change the drill to meet your goals. The Region will not come with a plan of its own to come out and run drills for a program.

3. The goal is to focus on big-picture related items and the process over the outcome.

Louisiana to host women's VNL stop

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo. – The U.S. Women's National Team will play on U.S. soil for the first time since winning the Olympic gold medal in Tokyo when it competes in the 2022 FIVB Volleyball Nations League (VNL) on May 31-June 5 at Brookshire Grocery Arena in Bossier City, Louisiana.

The U.S. Women, ranked No. 1 in the world, are the three-time defending VNL champions. Their Louisiana stop will kick off three weeks of VNL preliminary-round competition, and the only preliminary round hosted in the U.S. Top teams in the preliminary round advance to the final round on July 13-17.


Other countries that will compete in Shreveport-Bossier City are 2020 Olympic silver medalist Brazil, along with Canada, Dominican Republic, Germany, Japan, Korea, and Poland.

Shreveport-Bossier City hosted the U.S. Women's last

competition in the United States when the team qualified for the Tokyo Olympic Games in 2019.

"We are very happy to return to Shreveport-Bossier City as this is where the magic began," USA Volleyball President and CEO Jamie Davis said. "The fans and the cities were hugely supportive at the 2019 Olympic qualification tournament, and it is only fitting that we come back to celebrate together our first ever women's Olympic gold medal that we won in Tokyo. The VNL will showcase the world's best teams and will include a rematch of the Olympic final where the U.S. Women defeated Brazil.

"I want to thank the Shreveport-Bossier City Sports Commission and the cities of Shreveport and Bossier City for their tremendous support of USA Volleyball. We know that with you behind us, we are destined to win our fourth-straight VNL title."



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Salt Lake City to host 2023 Boys Nationals

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo. – USA Volleyball has selected Salt Lake City to host the 2023 Boys Junior National Championship (BJNC) on June 29-July 6 at the Calvin L. Rampton Salt Palace Convention Center.

The BJNC is the United States' premier junior boys club tournament for athletes ages 12-18 and attracts the most elite athletes and college scouts from across the country.

"We are so happy to be naming Salt Lake City as the host of USA Volleyball's 2023 Boys Junior National Championship," said USA Volleyball President and CEO Jamie Davis. "Salt Lake City is a wonderful destination with so much to offer beyond the court and we know that our athletes and their families will enjoy their time there while competing for one of 17 national titles."

"We are thrilled to have USA Volleyball host a qualifying event here in Utah with the 2023 Boys Junior National Championship," said Jeff Robbins, president and CEO of the Utah Sports Commission. "We welcome these athletes to Utah: The State of Sport and hope to make this a great experience for these young competitors."

The 44th edition of the BJNC is expected to bring thousands of athletes, coaches and supporters

to Salt Lake City resulting in an economic boost.

"Salt Lake will receive over \$18 million in direct impact from the Boys Junior Nationals, resulting in a tremendous lift for the community," said Clay Partain of Visit Salt Lake. "Our local economy continues to recover from the worldwide pandemic, and a sports event of this magnitude will help us accelerate that process."

Among the current Men's National Team players who have competed at the Boys Junior Nationals are Olympians Micah Christenson, T.J. DeFalco, Taylor Sander, Erik Shoji and Kawika Shoji.



How is the Badger Region Board structured?

The Badger Region Volleyball Association is governed by a Board of Directors that must be elected by members on a regular basis. Area reps serve three-year terms, while members of the executive board serve four-year terms.

Members, whether they are players, coaches, parents, directors, athletic trainers or officials, are encouraged to communicate with their respective representative if they


think policies or financial decision in the Region need to be changed.

Some policies enforced by Badger Region come from USA Volleyball, our sport's national governing body, so those can't be changed. But many others can.

The Board is advised by a 11 chairpersons (or experts) in various parts of the game, and five staff members (some of which have multiple responsibilities).

The state is divided into five parts geographically for representation. Plus, there are two at-large board members who you can approach if you don't feel comfortable with your current rep. And there is a rep dedicated just to issues that surround our Junior volleyball clubs and athletes.

You'll be hearing from each Board member twice a year in the form of a column in the Badger Beacon. Now, let's meet them:
