f 2020 was defined by words that included Virus, Social Distance, Remote, Canceled, Postponed, and Virtual, 2021 was a complete rebirth.



# A lesson for all coaches: It's volleyball

As I sat in a hotel lobby in Columbus, Ohio, waiting to head home after yet another great week of the AVCA Convention, I began reflecting on the week that was. That prompted me to grab my iPad and get to work on this article.

The first thing that comes to mind is how many awesome conversations I had all week. I was able to sit down and talk volleyball with people from every corner of our great sport, from national team coaches, division 1, 2, 3, NAIA, club, high school men's and women's coaches. I'm talking about conversations, not just sessions, but real conversations.

My biggest take away, after reflecting on this, is we never talked about men's volleyball or women's volleyball systems, we talked about VOLLEYBALL systems. I think this is where we have our greatest disconnect in our community of coaches, and where we hold ourselves back from our greatest growth, by assigning gender to skills and systems. Please hear me out, as I know I may have just lost a chunk of our readers. I promise it will get better.

I think the first thing we need to do when we think about systems, especially those that are outside of our "gender" or comfort zone, is change the way we approach the question. We need to ask "why," and not immediately look to why not to implement something.

The first session I attended was with USC Women's Head Coach Brad Keller (a former men's coach for many, many years), talking about improving your teams out of system offense. What I loved most about his presentation is he started it out with (my summary of his words), this may not be for some of you, and this might be, but just give it a thought.

Where I was immediately saddened was three minutes into the presentation I heard grumbling behind me of, "Why would we use that? That's a men's idea." I challenge us to get away from that



way of thinking, please don't go to that place. The place where we immediately say "why not", instead look at the skill at its face value and think about why this is being trained and discussed, and can this system FIT me and my athletes.

I'll admit for the longest time I fell into this trap with running the slide. That's a women's set, I don't run that on the men's side, we run a 5-1 it can't work with a back row attacker in right back. I went to the "why not" and lived there for a long time. After time I realized it wasn't the set that didn't belong, it was my lack of willingness to look at the slide.

it the best. They became my best resource. From those conversations it opened the door to more questions. We collaborated, in exchange for info on the slide, I talked about the Bic.

Speaking on the Bic, I'm sure all of us in Wisconsin had our eyes glued on the tv, or in the arena on Dec. 18 as the University of Wisconsin brought home its first ever National Championship! One thing that I took away from my time watching both the semifinals and the finals was the amount both Wisconsin and Nebraska utilized the Bic, and the back row. For it being a men's set, it sure seemed to make its way onto the biggest stage at the biggest moments.

Clearly both coaching staffs have looked at the "why" and chose not to define their systems by gender beliefs, but systems that leverage their athletes and create positive opportunities for their team. Again I'm not stating that every system fits every team, and player but I think it's time we work to not short change ourselves by antiquated gender assigning of skills.

It doesn't just have to be about the Bic or the slide. It can be any WAY more access to film and matches we should take it upon ourselves to push them and ourselves as coaches to the next level. Not limiting their abilities by what gender they play. I have spent most of my career coaching on the men's side, and during my time on the women's side I heard often in recruit meetings that people would often try to talk recruits out of playing for me because I was a men's coach.

My answer to them was I am a volleyball coach, anyone can play my systems, they just might take a little longer to get comfortable with. I left my 4.5 years at my women's program with the most wins in school history, and a very exciting offensive team to watch. I found my team learned to love the offensive differences, and I loved working with athletes so focused on the technical side of the game.

They proved they could be successful utilizing another type of system, and play the game a little differently than others. I now see some of those same players coaching their teams, and it is great to see some of those things making their way onto their courts as well.

My parting thought is I ask you all to view yourself as a volleyball coach, not a women's coach, not a men's coach, but a volleyball coach. Collaborate, ask questions, try something new, FAIL (it's OK, the best learning happens that way). For those of you fortunate enough to have the opposite gender where you coach, talk. REALLY talk, ask questions, look for the "why" and be open.

I have had some great conversations during my time at Concordia University Wisconsin with our former women's coach, and I look forward to those same talks with our new women's coach when the time comes.

And remember it's VOLLEY-BALL.

With a few conversations, some video, and a little creativity, we were able to look at our offense and find a way to not only run the slide, but run it with a back row attack, and create more blocking issues systematically with the team across the net. Admittedly it took me a bit to get to this point, but the biggest thing that helped me was going and having conversations with the women's coaches that I knew to find the "why", and how to utilize

and all topics; triple blocking, float serving, jump serving, the hybrid, offside defender under, offside defender wide, 5-1's, 6-2's, the list can go on. I think that if you open your mind to all possibilities and find what fits you, and your athletes, without creating mental barriers you could unlock even greater potential to your team.

I think more than ever as ALL athletes in our game are getting bigger, faster, stronger, and have



### Badgers win NCAA Div. 1 Championship

The University of Wisconsin Badgers just won their first national championship in program history. Dana Rettke ended her unbelievable career on top, hoisting the trophy over her head, as not only the best player in the nation but on the best team in the nation.

The Badgers pulled off the win in a five-set thriller over Nebraska. They executed their game plan at such a high level against a tough, hot, Nebraska team that just wouldn't go away.

As a team, the Badgers posted 24 blocks, the most in a national championship game ever. Rettke notched 11 kills and had 13 blocks to her name. She had some big help, though, as the freshman Anna Smrek led offensively with 14 kills on .429 hitting, Jade Demps had a magnificent game with 12 kills on .396 hitting and Grace Loberg finished off her career with 10 kills. Sydney Hilley dished out 51 assists and ended the match with a perfect set, all net, to her roommate Rettke.

This offense was able to get it done against an incredible Nebraska defense that posted 91



digs. It was so hard to put the ball away, but they got it done with great blocking and an amazing all-around effort. Lauren Barnes, again, put on a show in the backcourt with 31 digs.

The Badgers came out to a 7-0 start in the fifth. Absolutely everything went Wisconsin's way, but Nebraska re-grouped in a timeout with the mindset of "it's not over until its over." They chipped away at the deficit and got within three at 10-7, then 12-9, but Rettke and Demps gave the Badgers match point. Nebraska

fought off two match points, and you could hear Madi Kubik encouraging her teammates "we can do this." Kubik then sent one out of bounds and Wisconsin rushed the court to celebrate its first-ever national title when John Cook flashed the challenge card for a touch. The call was overturned and Nebraska had a glimmer of hope, but Rettke, the National Player of the Year, finished it off.

The most fitting end to her unbelievable career. She came back for her fifth year, and she finished on top.

### Ratings soar for season finale

Nebraska and Wisconsin put on a classic in the national volleyball championship match in Columbus,

Turns out, a lot of people were glued to it.

The Dec. 18NCAA Division I final on ESPN2 between the Huskers and Badgers drew 1.19 million viewers, making it the mostwatch national volleyball championship match in at least a decade. The number likely would have been higher if not for a contract dispute between Disney and YouTube TV, which left YouTube TV subscribers without ESPN channels over the weekend.

Viewership was up nearly 70% from the "2020" national championship played between Texas and Kentucky last spring, which had 696,000 sets of TV eves on it.

Wisconsin outlasted Nebraska in five sets to earn its first title.

More people tuned in to Nebraska-Wisconsin volleyball than they did the LA Bowl (1.01 million viewers), which began at 8:30 p.m. impressive considering the popularity of college bowl games on TV.

This is not the first time Nebraska and Wisconsin left an impression on the TV or on your favorite viewing device. The teams' Nov. 26 meeting in Madison gave BTN its mostwatched volleyball match in programming history (375,000 viewers).

# 3C clinics available for clubs

The Coaches Coaching Coaches program designed by the Badger Region has returned for the 2021-22 season. The program, also known as 3C, welcomes clubs to invite experienced and respected lead coaches chosen by the Badger Region to come to a practice and mentor a handful of lead coaches at a club.

They in turn would then take the information they learned at the clinic and pass it on to other coaches in the program.

The first 3C clinic wrapped up last week at River City Volleyball Club and the feedback has been great since.

Register soon as we will not be able to accommodate all requests.

A few notes:

1. The design of this opportunity is to have future mentor coaches from a club work with the 3C lead coaches from the Region while one or two teams practice like they normally would (this would not require your players/coaches to come in on another night). It is not designed to be for a club's whole roster of coaches. The Region hopes to work with 3-4 future mentor coaches from a club, plus the 3-4 coaches who are running the practices that night to be the ones we are truly working with.

2. The Region's coaches will not be running the practice. They will ask for a practice plan of the teams practicing in advance and we will critique. They will modify it, ask questions, and help reinforce a philosophy or change the drill to meet your goals. The Region will not come with a plan of its own to come out and run drills for a program.

3. The goal is to focus on big-picture related items and the process over the outcome.



## Officials get pay increase at signature events

The Badger Region Board of Directors approved in September an increase in officials pay at the marquee events hosted by the Badger Region.

Those events include the Badger Region Power League, Badger Region Qualifier, Badger Region Championships and Dale Rohde Memorial Boys Tournament.

The pay increase would help the Region ensure high quality officials would attend the event and

reward officials who serve at the Region's signature tournaments.

The pay increase puts officials at the following rates:

- \* Provisional: \$30/match
- \* Regional: \$32/match
- \* Junior National: \$34/match
- \* National: \$35/match

These event will also serve as a great opportunity for officials to serve a different role such as scorers, observers and mentors.

Due to the timing and imme-

diate budget impact this change could have on local tournaments, the smaller Badger Region-sanctioned events will not be required at this time to pay the higher rate.

By approving the pay increase, the Badger Region hopes to stay competitive in the officials' market for strong officials who often have options as to where they can officiate on a given weekend during the club volleyball season.

The goal of the Badger Region

is to recruit new officials, train officials, mentor officials and retain officials in the state of Wisconsin and throughout the Badger Region.

### Kiraly, Speraw to lead national teams through 2024

USA Volleyball has announced that it has re-signed indoor U.S. National Team head coaches Karch Kiraly and John Speraw to contracts through 2024.

Kiraly became the Women's National Team head coach in September 2012 after serving as its assistant coach from 2009-12.

In the previous five years, Kiraly led the U.S. Women win their first ever Olympic gold medal in Tokyo. The U.S. Women are also the three-time defending champions of the FIVB Volleyball Nations League (VNL), and they took silver at the 2019 FIVB World Cup. They are ranked No. 1 in the world.

During his first Olympic quad





with the team, Kiraly helped the U.S. Women to the 2014 FIVB World Championship title and the 2016 Olympic bronze medal.

Kiraly said that 13 minutes after winning the gold medal in Tokyo, he was already thinking about what the team might look like in Paris.

"Making history in Tokyo was immensely rewarding," Kiraly said. "It gets me hungry for

more, as it does for everyone in our program. I love this job, because I get the daily privilege of working with people I love; people of high character who are committed to learning and to pursuing epic team performance. I am honored and thrilled to get to do it for another three years."

Speraw became the Men's National Team head coach early in 2013 after serving as an assistant since 2007.

Since 2015, the U.S. Men have won bronze at the Rio Olympic Games and bronze and silver respectively at the 2018 and 2019 VNL tournaments. They took bronze at the 2018 FIVB World Championship and the 2019

World Cup.

Prior to the Rio Olympic Games, Speraw led the U.S. Men to victories at the 2014 FIVB World League and the 2015 World Cup.

"It is a tremendous honor to represent Team USA," Speraw said. "I love working with these athletes. It's a unique environment. On Team USA, you can develop really good relationships with guys because they can be in the gym a long time.

"Finally, we didn't do very well in Tokyo, so I want to make it right. I want to get back out there and give it another shot."

The Olympic Games in Paris are scheduled for July 26-Aug. 11, 2024



Members, whether they are players, coaches, parents, directors, athletic trainers or officials, are encouraged to communicate with their respective representative if they


think policies or financial decision in the Region need to be changed.

The Board is advised by a 11 chairpersons (or experts) in various parts of the game, and five staff members (some of which have multiple responsibilities).

The state is divided into five parts geographically for representation. Plus, there are two at-large board members who you can approach if you don't feel comfortable with your current rep. And there is a rep dedicated just to issues that surround our Junior volleyball clubs and athletes.

You'll be hearing from each Board member twice a year in the form of a column in the Badger Beacon. Now, let's meet them:


