As soon as you enter the facility, coaches, players and fans are observing you and making judgements. You will convey your professionalism if you arrive looking the part. Appropriate attire includes:

- \* Navy "dress" slacks
- \* No athletic or yoga pants
- \* "Certified Volleyball Officials" polo
- \* Plain white polo shirt is acceptable
- \* White athletic shoes
- \* Black belt

Some facilities are cold, so you might want to purchase the "certified volleyball officials" jacket. This is the only outerwear approved to be worn during a match.

## Update on reffing at Region Championships

Wanting to know if the Region has finished making assignments for the Badger Region Championships the weekends of March 19-20, March 26-27 and April 1-2?

For the most part, the answer is, "yes."

With multiple events (college matches, officials advancement and other tournaments in the area) taking place those weekends, there will be lots of opportunities to officiate.

Let's all work together to make sure all of the events in the Badger Region are staffed accordingly.

The Region is starting a waiting list of officials who would like to be contacted if another official drops out for whatever reason.

### So what does a typical USAV season look like?

The vast majority of USAV officials transition to USAV mid November, after the WIAA season is over and NCAA women's conference play is winding down. November and December are "prep" months for USAV, competing modules, updating calendars, exams, and watching the NCAA post season.

USAV tournaments typically run January, February and end in March with Badger Region Championships. Many officials "end" their USAV season after Champs. Several current and apsirting Junior National and National officials continue their growth opportunities here and in other states April through July.

### For National refs: A

National Official "Hub" is now available via USAV and a National dues link is open and available on the Hub. Mark your calendar for Feb. 23 for a live online Zoom National Clinic. The event is open to all and will be recorded for on-demand viewing. Registration is required through USAV Academy (opening soon)

2022 JN and National official candidates: Updates are available on USAV website for process,



materials, dates, fees, etc. Badger Region will be offering assistance on process and materials.

REFEREE REMINDERS

Please maintain your zebraweb calendar. If you take an assignment through a different assigning platform, remember to block those dates on your Zebraweb. The Region has had a record number of declines this season.

#### Reporting sanctions:

The Badger Region is working to track when

officials are administering red or yellow cards at Badger Region-sanctioned events. Officials are encouraged to report their violations and bookmark the form by clicking here.

**Scholarships:** Are you a senior in high school who plans to graduate in 2022? Then you are eligible for a Badger Region Scholarship. The Region scholarships are

### \* Do teams SWITCH sides at Badger Region events?

Teams do not switch sides in a match, unless there is a clear or unfair advantage of being on one side versus another. This is based on individual courts — not the tournament as a whole.

#### **SANCTION PROCEDURES**

Referees must recognize the difference between emotions or reactions during competition and conscious decisions or actions that result in unsporting conduct.

For a player on court: The 1st referee

directs the player being sanctioned to approach the 1st referee's stand to acknowledge the sanction. The 1st referee displays the appropriate card(s) to the sanctioned player and verbalizes,

"This [warning (yellow card), penalty, expulsion or disqualification] is for

your unsporting conduct." If the sanction is a penalty (red card), the 1st referee then signals to award a point to the opponent and ensures the 2nd referee and scorer are aware of the penalty point.

For a team member on the bench: The 1st referee whistles to call the game captain to the stand and then displays the appropriate card(s) and verbalizes, "This [warning (yellow card), penalty, expulsion or disqualification] is for player (or coach) 'X'. Please inform him/her of the [sanction]." The captain must go immediately to the bench to inform the team member, who acknowledges the [sanction] while the 1st referee displays the appropriate

card(s). If the sanction is a penalty (red card), the 1st referee then signals to award a point to the opponent and ensures the 2nd referee and scorer are aware of the penalty point.

For delay sanctions: The 1st referee calls the game captain to the stand and verbalizes, "This delay sanction is for [delay action]," while displaying the appropriate signal. The captain may inform the coach of the sanction for clarification purposes. If the sanction is a delay penalty, the 1st

referee then signals to award a point to the opponent and ensures the 2nd referee and scorer are aware of the penalty point.

For verbal warnings: Verbal warnings must be accompanied by a whistle and are issued through the game captain. Multiple warnings to the same team member during the same set/ match are permitted for

minor unsporting conduct.

For simultaneous sanctions to opponents: When individual sanctions are assessed to opponents for simultaneous unsporting acts, the team member from the serving team is sanctioned first, followed by the team member from the receiving team.

#### **HEAD COVERINGS**

A waiver for a head covering worn for medical, religious, or cultural purposes is not required and need not be requested by tournament staff or referees. Hats of any style are not permitted.

### Rulebooks will not be printed in time for any 2021-22 competitions
