Voeck to replace Pufahl in NCAA rules position

Julie Voeck, a collegiate volleyball official for over two decades, was named the NCAA secretary-rules editor for women's volleyball last month.

Voeck will begin her new role Sept. 1, 2023. Over the next year, she will shadow Marquette University's Anne Pufahl, the current NCAA secretary-rules editor for the sport whose term will end after 12 years of service.

During her time on the court, Voeck has officiated during the NCAA Division I Women's Volleyball Championship from 2004-21. In addition, she officiated the NCAA Division III Women's Volleyball Championship finals in 2011, 2012, 2021 and 2022, and the NCAA Division III Men's Volleyball Championship title match in 2014, 2018 and 2022.

The 2022-23 year will be her last calling matches on the court.

"This was a difficult decision, because I love officiating," said Voeck, who has served as president of the Professional Association of Volleyball Officials since 2012. "I wasn't looking to retire, but when this opportunity came up, it means I'm leaving as an active official sooner than I was prepared for."

In recent years, Voeck has regularly attended NCAA Women's Volleyball Rules Committee meetings to give committee members the perspective of an on-court official while they deliberate potential rules changes for the sport.

One of the changes Voeck is an

advocate of is the challenge review system, which has been a permanent fixture in NCAA women's volleyball since 2016.

"This is an exciting time in the sport," said Voeck, whose experience includes officiating internationally in the World University Games, Pan American Cup, and North, Central America and Caribbean Volleyball Confederation events. "My experience as an official, my interest in seeing the sport evolve and working with the challenge review system firsthand puts me in position to work with everyone involved in the game."

Voeck, who is a senior director for government affairs for a company focused on renewable energy policy in the Midwest, is also looking forward to broadening her conversation with those in the women's volleyball community.

Since she is an active official, her only dialogue with coaches relates to the match she is calling at the time. As secretary-rules editor, she will be able to have more in-depth discussions with them.

"I'm looking forward to getting perspective from coaches on how they would like to see the game shaped," said Voeck, who served on the National Association of Sports Officials board of directors from 2015-19. "I want to know what coaches want to see and what can we do in terms of training and the rules to improve the game. I am interested in that input."

BACKGROUND SCREENINGS

All adult staff members require a full background screening that includes the following:

- * Social Security Number validation;
- * Name and address history records;
- * Two independent Multi-Jurisdictional Criminal Database searches covering 50 states plus DC, Guam, and Puerto Rico;
- * Federal District Courts search for each name used and district where the individual currently lives or has lived during the past seven years, going back the length of time records are available and reportable;
- * County Criminal Records for each name used and county where the individual currently lives or has lived during the past seven years, going back the length of time records are available and reportable for each county searched;
- * National Sex Offender Registry database search of all available states, plus DC, Guam, and Puerto Rico;
- * Multiple National Watch Lists;
- * SafeSport Disciplinary Records;
- * Comprehensive International Records search for U.S. citizens who have lived outside of the United States for six consecutive months in any one country, during the past seven years;
- * Motor Vehicle Records of at least a 3-year history in the state of licensure; (if driving is required for position).

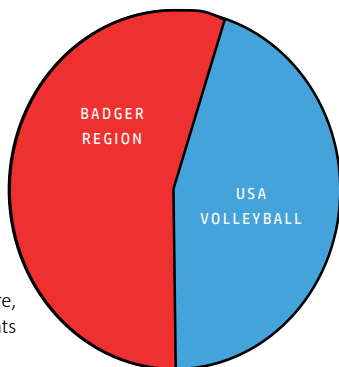

Adult nationals heading to Columbus in May of 2024

USA Volleyball has selected Columbus, Ohio, to host its 2024 Open National Championship on May 24-29 at the Greater Columbus Convention Center.

USA Volleyball will hold its annual meetings in Columbus ahead of the 2024 tournament and celebrate volleyball leaders and stars at its Hall of Fame presented at the Dorothy C. Boyce Banquet.

The USA Volleyball Open National Championship, the longest-running volleyball tournament in the United States, gives adult volleyball teams at every level a chance to compete against teams from around the country. Men's and women's teams with players ages 18-80 compete over the course of six days.

"USA Volleyball is looking

forward to bringing its Open National Championship to Columbus in 2024," said Jamie Davis, USA Volleyball president and CEO. "We always enjoy working with the Greater Columbus Sports Commission and the representatives of the Ohio Valley Region of USA Volleyball. We know our athletes and their families and friends will enjoy everything that Columbus has

to offer."

The 2022 edition of the USA Volleyball Open National Championship had more than 300 teams with approximately 3,600 athletes registered to compete.

Since 2002, Columbus has hosted 17 national tournaments including the 2021 NCAA DI Women's Volleyball Championship and several USA Volleyball events.

² **Female Only** - Players who were born on or after July 1, 2004, (who are defined as 18 & under by the USAV Age Definition) and are in the 11th grade for the current academic year are waived to compete in 17 & under. (This age waiver is based on resourcing concerns for 11th grade girls previously required to participate in girls 18's qualifiers and the 18's GIN.)

³ **Male Only** - Players who were born on or after July 1, 2008 (or players who were born on or after July 1, 2007 [15 years or younger] who shall neither have completed nor are in a grade higher than the eighth (8th) grade during the current academic year are eligible to play in the 14 & Under division. This exception is based on the net height difference of 7'4 1/8" to 7'11 5/8".

⁴ **Male Only** - Players who were born on or after July 1, 2008 (14 years or younger) who shall neither have completed nor are in a grade higher than the seventh grade (7th) during the current academic year are eligible for a Region approved waiver to compete in the boys 11's age group.

⁵ **Male Only** - Players who were born on or after July 1, 2009 (13 years or younger) who shall neither have completed nor are in a grade higher than the sixth grade (6th) during the current academic year are eligible for a Region approved waiver to compete in the boys 12's age group.

Tips for athletes and families for tryouts

Use this checklist to make sure you have all your ducks in a row as it pertains to things such as memberships, tryouts and more.

Memberships

The first step to tryouts is making sure you have a current Badger Region membership. Only a tryout membership or full membership are accepted for tryouts. Tryout memberships can be upgraded to the full membership after an athlete receives an offer from a club. For a link to junior membership options, [click here](#). As a heads up, parents must create a free profile and then purchase the junior membership in their athlete's name.

Age definitions

Refunds

The Badger Region does not offer refunds on memberships. Please make sure to purchase the correct membership for yourself,

your son or your daughter before clicking "buy." Information on a member's profile cannot be transferred to another member if a wrong purchase is made. That includes situations where mom buys a membership for herself, but meant to buy it for her son or daughter.

Membership Cards

Users will receive an email confirmation when they purchase a Badger Region/USA Volleyball membership. On that email is a copy of your member card that you can print. 10 musts at every tryout

1. Show up early. Give yourself plenty of time to go through the check-in lines, get your tryout t-shirt and warmup on your own.
2. Show a lot of hustle. If that means shagging a volleyball or bringing it in for a team huddle, never be least.
3. Keep your eyes open and your ears tuned in to anyone giving instruction. Evaluators want to see you engaged and absorbing instructions that are being given by the coaching staff.
4. Be coachable. If a coach asks you try something, gift it your all. Don't give him or her an excuse as to why you can't do it or say, "That's not what I was told before."
5. Be vocal. Coaches want to hear you call the ball, identify hitters and do all the little things while also being a great teammate.
6. Cheer for your teammates more than you celebrate your own success. Showing that you care for the team's success more than your own will really catch the coaches' eye.
7. Shake it off. If you let a bad serve, set, pass or swing remain with you, coaches will notice. Just get ready to move on to the next play.
8. Ask questions. If you don't understand a drill or want to clarify what you heard, do it. Don't be afraid to speak up.
9. Be a leader. Have an open court? Get a game going without being told to do so. Nobody stepping in to be a middle? Just go for it even if you're nervous.
10. Believe in yourself. Be your own advocate and do what is best for you.

What NOT to do at tryouts

1. Don't give your setter a hard time. Got blocked? Hit out? Shake it off and move on without placing blame.
2. Don't bring your cell phone into the gym. Coaches don't want to see you texting when you should be concentrating on volleyball.
3. Don't form cliques. Be sure to rotate who your partner is for drills and invite new people into your group.
4. Don't ever quit on a ball, even if you know it's unlikely that you'll get to it. Even in pepper! Coaches want players who give their all on every ball.
5. Don't talk when the coach is talking. It's disrespectful and sends a bad message to the coach.
6. Don't do anything halfway. Lazy footwork on free balls, not covering the hitter, walking to shag balls, etc. Give your all whenever you're in the gym.
7. Don't pay attention to your parents on the sidelines. No conversations or gestures. Coaches want to focus on the player, not the parent.
8. Don't carry a mistake with you into the next play. A coach can tell by your body language if you're not over being blocked on the previous point.
9. Don't be resistant to stepping into another position, even if it's not the one you're trying out for. Coaches want players who can adjust and are willing to be versatile.
10. Don't give off a negative vibe. Look like you're having fun playing the game. Smile, be upbeat, support your teammates, and enjoy yourself. Coaches like players who bring positive energy to the court.

Bonus: Don't show up for a tryout wearing a t-shirt from different club.

TRYOUTS: BEST PRACTICES

The Badger Region receives numerous calls and emails from athletes, parents and clubs about what can be done to improve the tryout process. While the Region cannot mandate most of what is listed below, the Region's Board of Directors and the Region Staff recommend the following as best practices:

Before tryouts

1. Retention Period

- Communicate with the Badger Region office if your club plans to utilize the Retention Period via the pre-tryout survey that will be sent out.
- Make offers Aug. 1-10, 2022, to athletes who played for your club during the 2021-22 club season. Make sure all paperwork is signed and filed and held by the club director until needed at a later time. (<http://badgervolleyball.org/wp-content/uploads/2019/07/Retention-Document-for-Clubs-2019-20.pdf>)
- Publicize on your website, social media, tryout flyers, etc., whether your club made Region Period offers
- Publicize on your website, social media, tryout flyers, etc., if only limited spots are available in your club for the 2022-23 club season



2. Communication

- Communicate with nearby clubs, or clubs who draw from the same pool of athletes, on dates/times to host tryouts. This will prevent athletes and families from having to pick one or the other when it comes to the first tryouts.
- Communicate your 2022-23 tryout times, dates and location to current/former families and the general public. (You can't do this enough.)
- Communicate open houses, tune-up clinics or other pre-season club events to current/former families and the general public.
- Communicate upcoming deadlines (pre-registration deadlines, commitment deadlines, other club-specific deadlines such as when a determination will be made if a team is going to "fold" or when first payments and contracts are due).

3. Other

- Examine the Badger Region's "delinquent payment" list maintained at the Region office.
- Be realistic. Seriously look at how many teams you can field (based on number of coaches available, gym time available, athletes in your area, other clubs in your area).
- As you consider the number of teams you can field, have a tentative plan for how many teams you expect to offer at each age division as well as your club philosophy on moving players to older age divisions if a player's skill level warrants or if needed to fill teams. Consider the trickle-down effect of moving players to older age groups and your club's subsequent ability to field teams at younger age levels.
- The Region recommends a pre-registration process to make sure all payment, paperwork, payments and membership card numbers are filed before arriving on site.
- Review all other Badger Region policies, procedures and dates as it pertains to tryouts.

During tryouts

1. Paperwork

- Make sure all players have a membership, medical release form and concussion form
- Ask all athletes if they have accepted a Retention Offer to another club. If they have and show a club listed in their membership account, you might want to ask that athlete to kindly not participate in the tryout.
- Do birth date checks on all athletes. Make sure that each athlete is trying out for the proper age level. Remember: Not all age waivers are granted. And under certain circumstances (teams who participate in Qualifiers/Nationals/Out-of-Region events), no age waivers are allowed.
- Collect other payment and club-specific paperwork. State if tryout fees can be refunded.



2. While on the court

- Coaches and directors should go into tryouts with an open mind.



TRYOUTS: BEST PRACTICES

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b. Give each athlete who walks through the door a fair shot. And put them in positions that will give them the best chance to succeed (i.e. Put the 4-foot-6 athlete in more passing drills than blocking drills).

c. Come with a plan. Hitting lines or kings/queens of the court for two hours is not a good plan.

d. Have a group of coaches running the drills/tryout plan and a different group of coaches evaluating. The two groups could chat on a regular basis throughout the tryout.

e. Be discrete when talking with other evaluators and/or coaches about the athletes, and/or have a place where you can discuss that is not within earshot of participants.

f. Take lots of notes. Rate them according to a scale that all directors and coaches in your club can use and understand. Athletes (and parents) want feedback as to why they didn't make a team.

3. Making offers and beyond

a. Communicate with all athletes whether they are getting an offer, if they are in line to get an offer, or if they are not getting an offer.

b. Remind athletes about the Badger Region Commitment Deadline (7 p.m. Monday after the start of the tryout period)

c. Explain your club's trickle-down process

d. Remind athletes how to make a commitment to a club in the member management system that will be discussed more at a later time.

e. Remind all athletes that if they pick a different club, it is OK. Tell them to let your club know right away so athletes in line for an offer will be able to get a spot sooner rather than later.



After tryouts

1. Filling teams

a. Have a deadline of when your club will determine if a team will fold or come to fruition

b. Have a plan in place if you get lots of athletes at one gender/age level and not a lot at another.

c. Utilize the Badger Region website page dedicated to players looking for teams.

d. Advertise on the Badger Region site if you have a team looking for players

e. Contact nearby clubs to see if they have similar situation, and work together to combine those two small groups of athletes into one team at one of the clubs.

f. Announce on your website/social media when a team is filled and that no more offers will be going out for that specific team

g. Alert athletes on the "waiting list" for that team that no more offers will be made

2. Finalizing your roster

a. Make sure your "committed" athletes have selected your club in the member management system. It is not official until this is done.

b. Make sure (again) that they meet the age requirements for this age group.

c. Make sure all paperwork is in for this athlete



3. Looking ahead

a. Take notes on what worked and what did not.

b. Offer refunds where applicable in a timely manner.

c. Update online listing where applicable.

d. Shred any paperwork from athletes not needed for the upcoming season

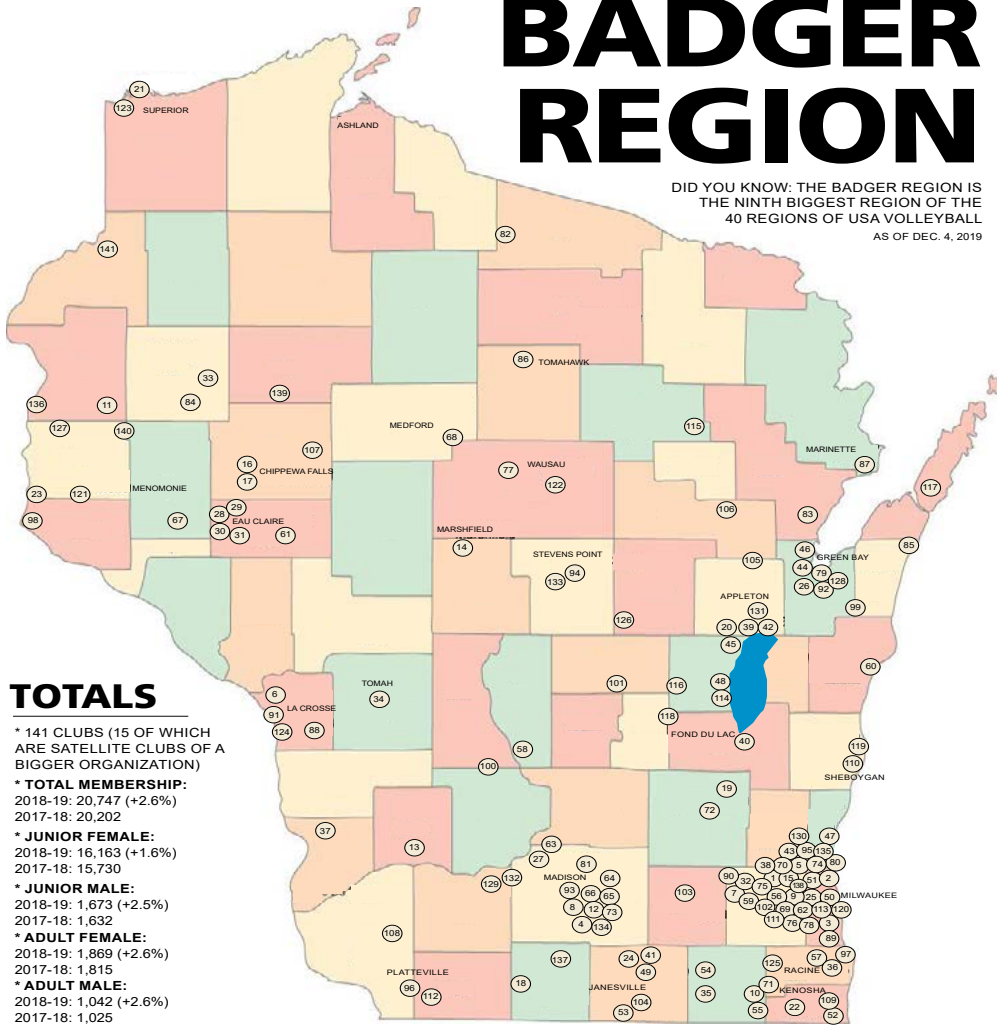

How is the Badger Region Board structured?

The Badger Region Volleyball Association is governed by a Board of Directors that must be elected by members on a regular basis. Area reps serve three-year terms, while members of the executive board serve four-year terms.

The state is divided into five parts geographically for representation. Plus, there are two at-large board members who you can approach if you don't feel comfortable with your current rep. And there is a rep dedicated just to issues that surround our Junior volleyball clubs and athletes.

Athlete buy-in brings boys team to title

Last minute coaching changes? No problem for the Badger Region Boys National Youth team who came home with the gold medal at the 2022 USA All-Star Championships in Tulsa, Okla.

With head coach Brian Rushmer sidelined the week before leaving for Tulsa, assistant coach JW Kieckhefer stepped into the lead spot – a role the back-to-back NCAA Div. 3 men's national champion coach at Carthage College felt comfortable with.

"It was a total team effort," Kieckhefer said about the collaboration between coaches in preparing the team for the four-day tournament in Oklahoma. "We did a good job of getting them to train a system and everyone bought in."

Assisting Kieckhefer throughout the week were assistant coaches Curtis Madson (Concordia University-Wisconsin), Mike Stevens (Southport VBC/Carthage College volunteer assistant), BJ Bryant (St. Norbert College) and Brian Sharkey (Southport VBC/Badger Region Staff).

"Our athletes believed in their coaches and our system. I felt a lot like I was coaching my college team," Kieckhefer said "We gave high-level feedback, and they would try and go do it. There were a lot of in-game strategies being thrown their way like flipping our block, and they did it. There was no questioning what was going on -- just doing. They trusted all of the coaches and executed."

In addition to having the five coaches listed above on the bench throughout most of the week, the team benefited greatly from having Rushmer at home scouting future opponents and doing video sessions for the athletes during downtime, much like the college experience requires for the athletes headed to the next level.

While having an army of coaches was surely unique and helpful, the success of the athletes still came down to executing on the court.

The team worked heavily on being efficient in out-of-system situations, changing from a traditional off-the-net mentality to setting out of system



balls high, inside and tight.

"We did a good job of scoring in these situations, better than our opponents, and that's a huge part of why we won," Kieckhefer said.

Not only did many of the athletes who played on the Badger Region Boys National Youth team play together during the club season at Milwaukee Sting and Milwaukee Volleyball Club, they also made up the majority of the Badger Region Boys Select team that earned the bronze medal at the 2021 USA All-Star Championships in Orlando.

In addition, five of the 11 athletes on the Boys Youth team this season participated in the National Team Development Training Program's summer series that took place in Tulsa before the team competed in the USA All-Star Championships.

"Our group played so much volleyball together. They were used to playing with each other," Kieckhefer said. "This group played like a team. It's not a coincidence that we did as well as we did thanks to how much time these boys spent together"

'Person over player' mentality pays off for Girls Youth team



How do you build a successful team in less than two weeks? Just ask Abbey Sutherland.

The University of Wisconsin-Green Bay head women's volleyball coach and leader of the Badger Region's Girls Youth High Performance team will tell you it's not easy.

"In HP, you're with the athletes for such a short amount of time, it's important to create a language that we can all speak together," she said. "It needs to be meaningful and impactful."

If meaningful and impactful means bringing home the Girls National Youth Championship at the 2022 USA All-Star Championship in Tulsa, then Sutherland and her coaching staff of BJ Bryant (St. Norbert College) and Scott Spiess (Badger Region Staff) met their goals.

After selecting the team from the tryout and three days at selection camp at the University of Wisconsin-Oshkosh earlier in July, the coaches asked the athletes what the definition of being a good teammate was all about.

"We went over the definition of leadership. We went through the list of what it means to be a good teammate. They picked the words that meant the most to them," Sutherland said. "And as coaches, we wanted to emphasize the person over the player."

At the USA All-Star Championships, the Girls National Select team faced fierce competition from all over the country including a North Texas Region team with multiple NCAA Div. I recruits on its roster and bitter rival Florida who is a powerhouse year in and year out at the tournament.

Against Florida, the Badger



Region team was up two sets to none with the chance to finish out the match.

"We had match point against Florida," Sutherland said. "But they're a very good team and responded well. What showed that we were high level as well as we had a response to their response and only lost by two points in sets three and four. That's not easy to do, and we weren't going to hang our heads after that match."

While suffering the tough loss to Florida was not what the Badger Region team had hoped for, it meant a chance at fresh start on the final day in the Girls National Youth division.

And with that clean slate, the

Badger Region swept both the Ohio Valley Region and the Puget Sound Region to earn the title in the Girls National Youth Division.

According to the coaching staff, the athletes bought in to everything they asked them to do.

"They took care of the little thing and the details," Sutherland said. "They made sure to get warmed up on time, they spent time cheering on other teams from Badger Region and did things as a team. This group truly wanted to be together and spend time together. That's unique and important. There was so much maturity in this group across the board."

Badgers put Wisconsin in national spotlight

We always knew Wisconsin was the center of the volleyball universe. And the University of Wisconsin women's volleyball team helped us solidify that.

It took athletes Dana Rettke, Sydney Hilley, Lauren Barnes and Grace Loberg using an extra year of eligibility brought on by the pandemic after deciding they couldn't leave Wisconsin without winning the program's first national title.

And they didn't have to.

The No. 4-seeded Badgers volleyball team took down Big Ten foe No. 10 University Nebraska in a dramatic five sets — 22-25, 31-29, 25-23, 23-25, 15-12 — in the NCAA Women's Volleyball national championship game in Columbus, Ohio, in December of 2022.

Wisconsin won its first title behind a block that tormented the Huskers. The Badgers began the fifth set on a 7-0 run that was punctuated by a kill and two blocks on three straight points by Rettke, the American Volleyball Coaches Association Player of the Year. The Badgers thought they won when outside hitter Madi Kubik hit the ball out, but a successful challenge



from Nebraska coach John Cook overturned the call as officials ruled there was a touch at the net.

The next play, after a couple of tremendous defensive plays by Nebraska, Rettke terminated the championship point.

"I honestly don't think it's set in yet," Rettke said in a USA Today article. "I mean, I kind of imagined, like, dropping to the floor and crying and I kind of just stood there in shock."

The Huskers were all over the Badgers in the first set and led most of the way in the second set. Trail- ing 13-8 at one point, the Badgers tied the game at 20 on a monster block by Loberg and Rettke, and took the lead on the next point, which was only Rettke's second kill.

But behind what Wisconsin coach Kelly Sheffield called the best

defense in the country, Nebraska gave itself numerous opportunities with some incredible digs, and battled the Badgers to an epic conclusion of a second set that was tied at 23 through 29.

Like she had done so many times before, with Wisconsin down 29-28, Rettke got a solo block on Nebraska middle blocker Lauren Stivrins, followed by a kill and another block on Stivrins to win the set.

Middle blocker Devyn Robinson had back-to-back kills to seal the third set and put the Badgers one set away from a championship. But the drama was far from over.

Nebraska had a 24-20 lead in the fourth set before the Badgers won three straight points. It took an incredible diving save by Nebraska outside hitter Madi Kubik to keep the point alive, which was finished emphatically by Ally Batenhorst to send the match to a final set.

The Badgers had 24 blocks to Nebraska's 10. Neither team hit above .200. Middle blocker Anna Smrek led the Badgers hitting .500 with 14 kills while Rettke hit .290 with 11 kills.

"Epic weekend. Just an epic weekend," Sheffield said in the article. "I'm so happy for these guys

and the other seniors. They came back for a goal and a dream and had some adversity along the way and were rewarded."

On the first championship point, Barnes, the libero, took a long exhale to calm herself and possibly make the final pass of her college career. But the Badgers had to endure four of them, plus a timeout at 14-11, then a painstaking challenge after believing they won.

"During the challenge we kind of just kept making eye contact with each other, looking at each other in the eye, saying, 'All right, if this doesn't go our way, we're still playing volleyball,'" Barnes said to USA Today. "We haven't done anything yet. The game isn't over."

The second celebration was just as historic as the first.

"I think most of it was just shock," Hilley said in the USA Today article. "You look around, everyone's crying. You could see how much love there is with every single person on this team. And the fans were incredible. And it's an amazing moment I'll never forget just seeing how happy my teammates were. And that's the best feeling."

UW-EC basks in historic winning season

The University of Wisconsin-Eau Claire Women's Volleyball team made history with its first NCAA Division III National championship victory in early December of 2021 in St. Louis, Mo. Coaches and players say the win put the team on the map and will strengthen the program moving forward.

The championship title also marked the first time the UW-Eau Claire women's volleyball team made it to the NCAA Division III quarterfinals. After defeating Tufts University, the fourth-ranked Blugolds swept top-ranked Juniata College in the semifinals to advance to the title match..

UW-Eau Claire faced sixth-ranked and traditional Division III powerhouse Calvin College in the championship match. It was a



rematch of sorts — Calvin defeated Eau Claire in the 2018 NCAA Division III semifinals.

But the 2021 championship was all about UW-Eau Claire as the team swept Calvin in

three sets.

Head coach Kim Wudi, also a longtime member of the Badger Region Board of Directors, said at the time that the gravity of the situation "hasn't really sunk in yet."

"We're just really, really proud to bring home a national championship," Wudi said in an NPR article posted following the event. "There's really only been a couple of other sports at the university who have been able to win the team championship and to be able to do it for women's volleyball for the first time is really, really special."

Wudi said clinching the championship follows a historic winning season for the team. She

Firebirds win back-to-back men's titles

Carthage men's volleyball won its second-straight NCAA Division III national title with a 25-21, 25-22, 18-25, 25-22 victory over top-ranked Springfield on April 23, 2022, at Carthage's Tarble Arena in front of standing-room only crowd in Kenosha.

"It was a storybook the way last year ended," head coach JW Kieckhefer said in an interview with the Badger Region. "The fans. Doing it at home. And validating it by doing again in 2022 when they wanted to take away of what we did in 2021 because some teams didn't compete due to COVID or didn't make the tournament. I feel accomplished about validating that first national championship."

The Firebirds claimed their second-straight national title behind defensive efforts from Peyton Wieter (16 digs) and All-American libero Kyle Cohan (12 digs). All-Americans Matt Slivinski (18 kills) and Germantown native and former Badger Region member Carter Schmidt (11 kills) led the offensive effort, while All-American setter Gene McNulty had 43 assists.

This was also the second-straight national title under the direction of Kieckhefer, who is a Badger Region member (coach at Milwaukee Volleyball Club) and was named the



College Conference of Illinois & Wisconsin's (CCIW) Coach of the Year.

Slivinski, McNulty and Cohan were named to the NCAA all-tournament team, while Slivinski was named the tournament MVP for the second-straight year.

"I think the excitement, the happiness, the accomplishment has finally sunk in for all of us," Kieckhefer said. "I think we love battling for each other. That's what makes the practice gym so much fun. But when you enjoy being around this group as much this group does, the accomplishment feels amazing."

In the match, each team traded points early in the first until an

attack error for Springfield (29-2) and a block from McNulty put Carthage (24-3) up 4-2. Slivinski put in a kill which extended the Firebird lead to 10-5 forcing a timeout. Springfield rallied getting within one with two straight kills but an 8-3 run for the Firebirds made it 20-15. Another rally from Springfield got it to three until a service error for the Pride made it set point. Carthage won the set with a closing kill from another current Badger Region member David Markes (a coach at Milwaukee Volleyball Club and former player at the club).

The second began similar to the first with each team trading points until a Springfield service error and a block from Wieter put the Firebirds ahead 10-7. The Pride got within three with a kill then an ace made it 14-12 before Markes connected on another kill. After Carthage scored the next three of five points, Springfield got within two with a kill. Slivinski registered another kill extending the Carthage lead to 20-17. Later, Schmidt tallied a kill moving the score ahead to 23-20. Another Slivinski strike gave Carthage the set 25-22.

In the third, the Pride scored the first three with a pair of kills and an ace, before an attack error for Springfield tied it at six. After back-to-back attack errors for the Pride put Carthage in front 11-8,

Springfield tied it at 11 with an ace. The Pride later went up three with a kill 18-14 as a kill widened the margin to five. Springfield won the third 25-18.

The score was locked at 11 in the fourth as the Pride connected on a kill. Once again, both teams traded points until Slivinski recorded another kill moving the score to 18-17. Springfield went on to tie it at 22 however, a bad set for the Pride gave the Firebirds set point. Carthage won the game off an attacking error for the 25-22 set win.

With the graduation of Slivinski and Cohan, the question becomes do the Firebirds have enough in them to make a run in 2023?

"I think we have the team to do it," Kieckhefer said. "I am very excited for this group of young men. But it's going to be different. It's tough to lose guys who have been leaders for us the last three years. We'll combat matches differently. But we're excited for the guys who have been behind Matt and Kyle."

Winning back to back titles in any sport or competition is never easy, let alone going for three.

"It's going to be hard. But we're going to battle," Kieckhefer said. "Think about how hard it was going back to back. Now triple that."

said they've gotten support from fellow coaches, former players and other alumni excited about the future of the volleyball program.

"That's our goal, is to win championships," Wudi said to NPR. "And so to have that not just be something we're striving toward, but something that we've done, is really great in terms of the ability to recruit high-level players and high-level student athletes from really across the country."

Abby Volk was a senior at UW-Eau Claire and the team's middle hitter.

"It was surreal," Volk said to NPR. "We still

talk about it today even, we just don't believe that it's real."

Volk said beating the best-ranked teams in the nation the year after all fall sports on campus were canceled due to the COVID-19 pandemic was special. She said defeating Calvin College, with some members of the 2018 Eau Claire team in attendance, was an added bonus.

"So, I mean, it was kind of a revenge match, but we also wanted to continue making history," Volk said.

Arianna Barrett, Kendra Baiert, and Charlie Nelson were named to the NCAA Championship All-Tournament team. Barrett was named the tournament's Most Outstanding Player.

The American Volleyball Coaches Association announced Jodi Risen of the University of Wisconsin-Eau Claire volleyball team as the AVCA Division III Assistant Coach of the Year.

Risen, a former Blugold volleyball athlete herself, is in her 13th year with the UWEC coaching staff and has helped Eau Claire reachover 300 wins while on staff.

As a player, she led the team to a share of the WIAC Conference title in 2006 and to the Sweet Sixteen round of the NCAA tournament in 2005 and 2006.

Risen is the first WIAC Assistant Coach to receive the award since the award started in 2009.

UW-EC men & women win club titles

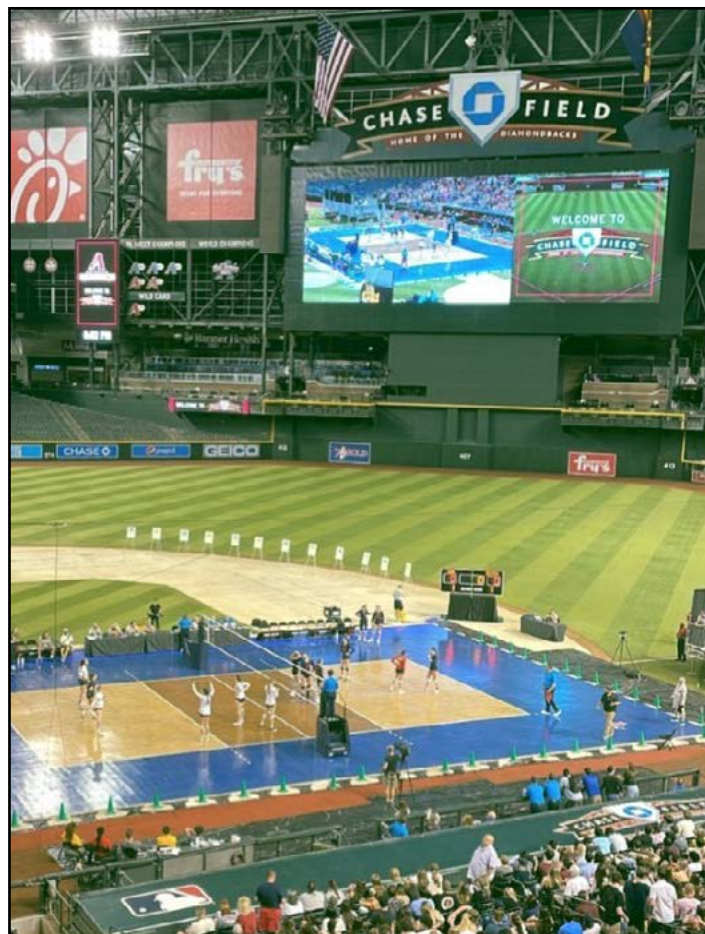

'We got this' says FC Elite 16-Navy

The greatest feeling a coach can have is when their team says during a timeout, "Don't worry coach, we got this."

Truer words were never spoken by the FC Elite 16-Navy team to their head coach Jeff Van Lannen en route to winning the 16-National Division at the 2022 Girls Junior National Championship in Indianapolis.

And even with their backs up against the proverbial wall, the 16-Navy team fought their way out of near-elimination multiple times in ways that only Hollywood could have scripted.

On the final day of competition, the team was the 8-seed having to play the No. 1 overall seed in the quarterfinals in Absolute from the Northern California Region.

The first set was a nail biter, with FC falling 30-32. But the second set was not as close, as Absolute pulled ahead and managed to be serving up 24-18 for the match. But 16-Navy was not done.

They ran the score all the way up to 24-24 before allowing Absolute to sideout. And before you know it, FC won set two, 27-25.

The roller coaster continued in set three as FC fell behind again and faced elimination down 9-14. But the comeback kids showed zero worry.

"We always had that feeling that this could be the end," said head coach Jeff Van Lannen. "But we weren't going to show it."

Point by point, FC Elite chipped away and came out on top in one of the best matches of the tournament.

"Two coaches came up to me after the match and said we staved off 11 elimination points," Van Lannen said. "It was almost statistically impossible for us to win that match, but we did."

That was only the first match of the day.

FC Elite 16-Navy had another three-set match in the semifinals against Maverick Elite from the Ohio Valley Region.

"Maybe they sort of liked that feeling of playing from behind,"



Van Lannen said.

In the finals, 16-Navy fell to Iowa Six Pack in the first set and was down 22-23 in set two – but the team wouldn't have had it any other way.

As the story goes, FC Elite battled back, took control of set three and let out a sigh of relief – along with screams of joy – when victory was officially theirs.

"When the last point landed, you saw it in their eyes, 'We did what?' It was pretty great," Van Lannen said. "From there it was podium, celebration and so much more."

Outside hitter Peyton Carlson, who was only 14-years-old at the time of the tournament, was named the Most Valuable Player event.

Heading into the tournament, 16-Navy was ranked 10th in the National Division after earning their bid at the Badger Region Qualifier in late February. The team had a good Day 1 and a good Day 2, losing only to Houston Juniors on a missed served.

"After losing on a missed serve early in the tournament, I stopped saying the word 'serve,' stopped looking at the endline and just let them go. I trusted them," Van

Lannen said. "Anything I wanted to say, I wrote it down and then I didn't say the first three things I wanted to say. I stood back and let them do it on their own."

The hardships and hurdles the team overcame didn't just stop with a missed serve.

Throughout the tournament, the team was without Kam Kaminski, who had torn her ACL just weeks prior to leaving for Indianapolis for the national tournament.

On top of that, one outside hitter and one right side hitter suffered minor injuries throughout the week in Indiana but were able to return by week's end.

The team knew it had the ability to win, and Van Lannen knew that as well.

"When we were making our final run on Day 4, I was like, 'What am I going to say at this point?'" Van Lannen said. "There were some points you tell the kids 'you got this.' And you say that over and over. And then after a while, they started telling that to me. It was so heartwarming."

The official celebration for the team did not happen until they returned home and could unite in full, with Kaminski, back in the

The team (and the entire club) were also honored by the Wisconsin Timber Rattlers at a minor league baseball game in late summer.

"Coaches have asked 'what's the secret sauce?' I tell them that every day, we ask the players what their job is," Van Lannen said. "And every day they say 'love each other,' and the coaches job is to love them, too."

We had so many girls who could play different positions that our lineups rarely – if ever – looked the same."

MKE Sting club director said the 14-White team, which finished one place out of earning a spot in a bid division at the Windy City Qualifier, was one of his favorite teams to watch all season.

"The team was hoping to earn a bid. We spent the weeks leading up to nationals waiting and wanting," Bayer said. "It's surreal, because this team was the last team to be accepted into

the tournament in the Patriot Division. But the kids never gave up and they always stayed positive about their situation."

Hiedenrich added that being able to step back onto the court in Indianapolis was a fresh start for the 14-White crew.

"Our team had to completely shift our mindset in a matter of weeks," she said. "When they stepped into the gym in Indianapolis, it was a completely different team. Third place wasn't going to be enough anymore. They wanted first. They wanted to prove that they were better than anyone could have imagined."
